Subdomain: Livestock and animal production

The total number of pigs decreased by 4.4% in 2016 compared to the previous year.

- In 2016, compared to the previous year, the sheep and goats livestock increased, while the cattle, pigs and poultry livestock decreased.
- Regarding the sheep and goats livestock, Romania occupied the fourth place in 2016 among the European Union Member States.

The total number of cattle decreased by 2.0% at December 1, 2016 and the origin livestock (milk cows, buffalo cows for reproduction and heifers for reproduction) increased by 0.3%.

The total number of pigs and the origin livestock (sows for breeding) decreased by 4.4% and by 3.6%, respectively.

The total number of sheep and goats and the origin livestock (sheep, ewes and goats) increased by 1.0% and by 0.3%, respectively.

The total number of poultry and the number of adult laying poultry decreased by 3.8% and by 6.5%, respectively.

The livestock evolution in the period 2006 - 2016

The cattle livestock decreased from 2006 until 2011. Since 2011, the cattle livestock has been kept at an approximately constant level, reaching to 69.9% in 2016 compared to 2006.

The pigs livestock constantly decreased, reaching to 69.1% in 2016 compared to 2006.

The sheep and goats livestock have registered annual increases (except 2010), reaching 11358.6 thousand heads in 2016, 35.1% more than in 2006.

The poultry livestock registered 75689.9 thousand heads in 2016, 10.9% less than in 2006.

Chart :The evolution of the livestock existent at December 1, in the period 2006 – 2016




